Of course it would be nice to have more things on the Green, but the fact of the matter is that it costs money to hire musicians. The days of wandering troubadours are long since past! Insurance, in our increasingly litigation-

obsessed public, is another consideration, as is overuse of the Green itself.

The overwhelming success of the Community Celebrations at the end of the Arts Festival this summer was heart-warming, but the cost was borne by the Festival. Many residents of Broadway object very strongly to paying to see something on 'their Green' as I well know from years of experience as Secretary to the Traders' Association.

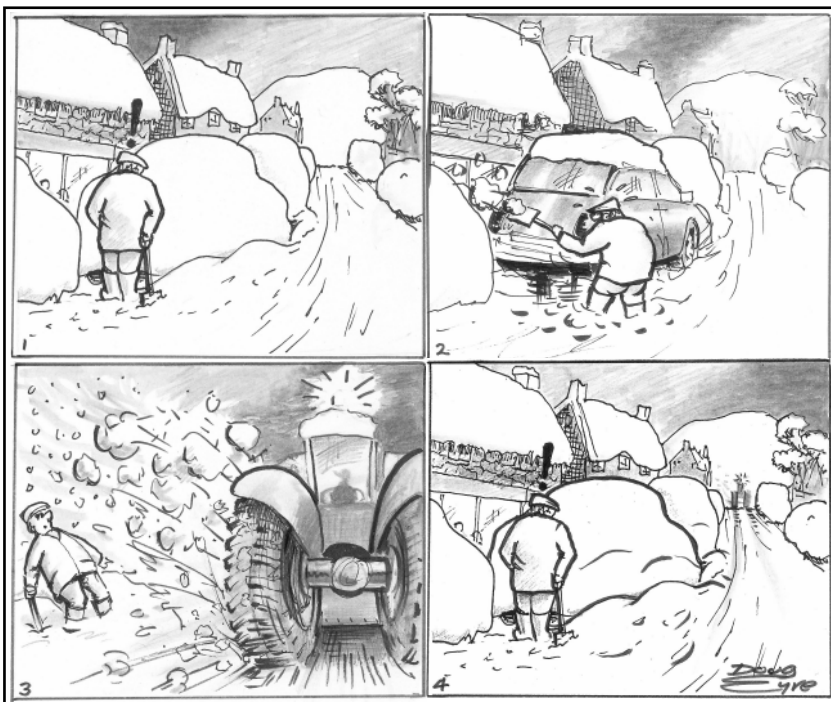
By all means have a notice board, but unless it is managed by someone responsible for its updating and appearance and, more importantly, leads to more people actually

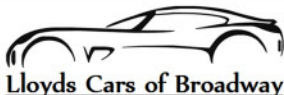

CHANGES TO THE LEADERSHIP TEAM AT WORCESTERSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

County Cabinet Change

Following a poor judgement from the October Ofsted Inspection of Safeguarding (Inadequate) and Looked after Children's Services (Adequate) and in line with the judgement that the Local Authority had capacity to improve, Cllr. Eyre's role on the Cabinet changed to that of Cabinet Member with responsibility for Children's Social Care and Lead Member for Children Services. This role includes:

- Children's social care services including family services and child protection
- Corporate Parenting
- Social Care Policy development and Quality Assurance
- Youth Offending Services

County Leader Change

Following an allegation against the Leader of Worcestershire County Council the Leader, Dr Lord, has resigned. Cllr Adrian Hardman, Bredon Division, was unanimously chosen by his group to be Leader of Worcestershire County Council.

WORK IN PROGRESS IN BROADWAY

Speed bumps, Sandscroft Avenue - at present, unless there was a compelling bank of evidence that this is an accident cluster site, it would not be looked at.

Seven Trent's response to manhole and overflow problem near to Wythbrook is still awaited.

There will be a meeting with Roy Fullee (County Highways) to discuss problems and costing in connection with:

- The verges outside Lloyds Bank
- The possibility of a dropped area approach to the Hunt Field
- Back Lane (which is a private road)
- A - Board removal as appropriate
- Yellow lines on Station Road
- The Bloxham Road/Leamington Road Junction
- The weepings along Childswickham Road
- The refurbishment of the Escape Lane on Fish Hill

THE LOCALISM BILL – EXTRACTS FROM A SUMMARY FROM CLLR EYRE

Neighbourhoods will be the 'building blocks of the Big Society' in radical **new planning reforms** proposed to hand powers down from Whitehall bureaucrats and Town Hall officials to communities so that local people shape the character of the very neighbourhood in which they live. Secretary for Communities and Local Government, Eric Pickles and Planning Minister, Greg Clark, have outlined

the following proposals to decentralise and streamline the planning system.

Neighbourhood groups to shape where they live: Communities will be able to come together to decide what their area should look like, where new shops, offices or homes should go and what green spaces should be protected. Parish councils and new neighbourhood forums of local people - rather than town hall officials - will lead the way in shaping their community. If local people then vote in favour of new 'Neighbourhood Plans' in local referendums, councils will have to adopt them.

Direct democracy: This will be an incentive to people and communities to come together to take control of planning. The new powers will also allow communities to give planning approval to chosen sites on local land.

Local benefits from local development: At the heart of the new approach will be a package of powerful incentives, such as the New Homes Bonus, that will encourage the right kind of local development and financially reward those councils and communities that deliver new homes and businesses to their area.

After the considerable amount of snow prior to Christmas 2010, my husband decided to clear the area around the junction of Morris Road/ Bloxham Road on 22nd December. The day before, we, like many others, had got stuck at this junction where the snow had become rutted, deep and almost impassable. It was proving to be a real hazard and more snow was forecast.

During the time he worked, with the exception of 3 people - one who moaned the lack of community in Broadway, a second who was stuck further up the road, and a third who promised help but never reappeared, no-one talked to him, offered help or thanked him for his work. Most kept their heads well down and avoided eye contact. On the 23rd, a lone woman was spotted clearing the Mills Close/Morris Road junction.

The Big Society? The Clare Balding idyll of chocolate box Broadway? It was nowhere to be seen.

Please tell me that all of Broadway is not like this. I have yet to be convinced.
