SAVING BROADWAY FROM DEVELOPERS – PROTECTING OUR VILLAGE FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS.

From the Save Broadway Action Group

A public open meeting to discuss proposed development plans in Broadway has been called for **Tuesday November 6th**. The meeting has been organised by the Save Broadway Campaign and will be held at the Lifford Hall starting at 7.30pm. The object of the meeting is to demonstrate the level of support and explain the implication of any proposed development in the village. It is also to call for a thorough and official assessment of all future housing needs. To ensure success the campaign needs your support. The Save Broadway Campaign is calling for all residents to support the call to fight further development in this area of outstanding natural beauty. The campaign is not against housing to meet local needs. Approaches to MPs, the county council, district councils and other pressure groups are planned to ensure people understand the full implications of ill-considered development in village communities. Support has already been received from Destination Worcestershire Action Group. Chair Gordon Franks said: "This is not a case of nimbysism. The infrastructure in Broadway is already under strain; sewerage and drainage are a big issue. The village already has a population nearing 3,000. Broadway recently underwent a review and complied with demands for additional housing. This is an iconic Cotswold village in an area of outstanding natural beauty. It is a setting people travel from all over the world to visit. It is not a sprawling would-be town. This is a case of Saving Broadway for our heritage and the Nation; that is why we have adopted a zero tolerance approach to developments proposed by people with little interest in the village."

The Save Broadway campaign was launched following a packed extraordinary parish council meeting, called to highlight proposed plans to develop land in Averill Close, Station Road and Leamington Road. Plans could impose another 350 homes on the village. During the meeting, angry residents voiced their concerns and called for action to stop development that would threaten the character of our iconic Cotswold village and overload its infrastructure and amenities to breaking point. With growing concern over proposals to further develop the village and add rural sprawl, the Save Broadway Action Group has been approached by residents, traders and tourists, all concerned over the level of misinformation.

The proposed meeting will provide an open forum to ensure residents understood every element of proposed development, what it would mean now and for the future. The Save Broadway campaigners have already started petitioning villagers to reflect the level of concern of proposed additional developments. Social media campaigns are planned to build support from the thousands of worldwide visitors to Broadway. Alliances with other groups fighting to protect their local landscape have also been formed. The objective is to provide a powerful lobby to take to Westminster.

An information web site www.savebroadway.co.uk has gone live fully explaining the campaign and all actions.

CHANCEL REPAIR LIABILITY

Well I 'm sure that by now most people will have heard that as soon as I arrived as Priest in Charge of Broadway, Chancel Repair Liability (CRL) was also here and had hit the press and TV locally and nationally.

What is CRL? Well it is a liability on some homeowners whose land previously came under Henry 8th many hundreds of years ago. The church still has a right to ask that these people pay to maintain the chancel of the church i.e. the east end of the church building where the altar and choir are situated.

A week after I was licensed I found that people were receiving letters from the land registry informing them that this CRL existed on their properties. For whatever reason people, had not been not aware of this before and were extremely upset (which is an understatement!).

I made the Diocese aware and called an extraordinary PCC meeting. We decided to hold a public meeting and to write to the Charity Commissioners for what's known as advice under section 110. This we have now received. The land registry were contacted again after another PCC meeting in September and the CRL claim is to be or has been removed from the title deeds on Broadway properties.

However, Peter Luff our MP held a meeting on 17th October to try to help further with this matter. A section 110 can only go so far and doesn't fully protect either the PCC or the homeowners as well as we would wish it to. Although we've removed the claim on CRL this still exists on these properties until they sell them after October 12th next year or if they choose not to sell it will remain there.

So why has this come about now?

The government 10 years ago passed that if you sold a property with CRL after October 2013 and it hadn't been registered then the liability for the new owners disappears. If it has been registered it's there for life.

All PCC members are charity trustees and have to act responsibly for that charity and do the best they can for them otherwise they could be held liable for not acting in the best interests of their charity. So all church PCC's been advised to look into the CRL on their churches.

The government and church can't just abolish CRL because some churches have patrons which can afford to help them to look after their chancel. Therefore each individual PCC has to look into this and decide what to do.

Broadway PCC looked into this many months before I arrived and followed the only course of action they thought they had open to them and have been the first to get as far as they have. before I arrived and followed the only course of action they thought they had open to them and have been the first to get as far as they have. They didn't want to do this and have, with the help of the Diocese and our MP Peter Luff strived to do what is right for the community

whilst also being aware they are trustee's and have also to do what is right for the church building that people love so much.

Fortunately we have been granted a Section 110 and as a PCC we are now helping Peter Luff MP as much as we can because 5200 other parishes approximately up and down the country have also to look into this matter. My thoughts and prayers are still with the Broadway homeowners and the PCC and I thank everyone who has helped me to find a way through this and supported us with prayer. It isn't an easy matter for anyone to try to work through and come through the other end intact yet we have.

CHANCEL REPAIR LIABILITY – A lesson to be learnt.

Thirty Broadway residents received a letter from the Land registry on July 6th this year. What a shock!

We had no idea that this was gong to happen, no warning from the church or anybody. It took us about a week to even understand what Chancel repair was all about. Houses that had been purchased only 5 years previously had no inkling from their solicitors of the liability. Luckily for the residents, we had a very switched on new vicar in Rev Michelle Massey, and after a public meeting a committee was formed to try and ensure that the properties were not registered.

The Cotswold Journal got involved, together with the Gloucester Echo and the Daily Telegraph. Support was gained from MP, Peter Luff, together with Lord Colwyn, the Deputy Speaker of the House of Lords, and the campaign began with radio interviews and TV appearances. We contacted various people in the church administration, but they blamed the law. Apparently it was all down to the PCC.

The campaign took about 6 weeks of concentrated effort; what it showed was that when we want to fight against injustice, we can.

Our vicar had been working on a letter to the Charity Commissioners and they replied in favour of the points made in the report.

Finally, on September 21st, we began to receive letters from the Land Registry telling us that the applications for Broadway had been withdrawn. Peter Luff has arranged a debate in the House of Commons in an attempt to get this archaic law changed. He needs support, so if you are aware of any other parishes with the same problem, tell them to contact him.

The first lesson to be learnt is that, until the law is changed, if you are purchasing a property, ensure your solicitor is aware of the chancel liability and that you are given the correct advice.

The second is – do not underestimate the power of a good committee that is determined to work together for the common good!

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A little something to go with last month's Orzo dish and a little something to tempt you to Prego, Broadway.

Pork Saltimbocca

I make it with pork often but traditionally this is a veal dish. Serves 2 (halve the recipe for 1 person)

- 8oz (225g) pork tenderloin
- 6 slices Parma ham
- 6 large fresh sage leaves
- 6 slices(thin) lemon
- 6 fl oz (170ml) Marsala
- 1 ½ tbsps Olive oil
- Salt and black pepper

Method:

- 1 Cut the tenderloin into 1inch slices.
- 2 Place a slice of pork between two layers ofclingfilm and bash lightly with a rolling pin. Be careful not to break up the meat. You should end up with a thin escalope.
- 3 Repeat the process for the remaining slices and season each one with salt and pepper
- 4 Place a slice of lemon on each escalope with a sage leaf on top of that.
- 5 Secure each slice with a cocktail stick as if it were a darning needle.
- 6 Gently, warm the Marsala through in a saucepan.
- 7 Heat the oil in a frying pan until fairly hot and fry the escalopes for two minutes on each side.
- 8 Add the Marsala and allow it to bubble until it becomes quite syrupy.
- 9 Transfer the pork to a serving plate and remove the cocktail stick.
- 10 Pour over the sauce and serve with pasta, sautéed potatoes, risotto or sides of your choice.

BROADWAY STATION UPDATE

The last few months have seen steady progress at the station site. A big thank you goes to all those who braved the weather and came to our open evening in May to see what we have been doing. Thanks also to those who visited our gazebo at the Jubilee and Olympic Torch events and at the Horticultural Show.

On site our main activity has been the continuation of construction of the platforms, and work has been started on the southern end of platform 2. We are now looking for people to sponsor edging slabs for this platform, at a cost of £20 each. Each donor will receive a certificate and their name will appear on a roll of honour to be displayed in the new station building. Forms are available at the station site or can be downloaded from

Visitors can now get a better view of the site from the recently-constructed viewing stand. This is usually open when work is in progress on Wednesdays and Saturdays, so please come along and have a look. An old-style red telephone box has been obtained, and is currently being refurbished. Lots of imperial-sized bricks are required for the platform construction, and we are always on the lookout for likely sources. Recently we unearthed some more of the original bricks from the old platform 2, and some of these are now in the new platform 1!

Looking further south, the fortunes of the railway as a whole are improving. The appeal target to repair the landslip near Winchcombe has been reached, and by the time this is published trains should be running over the whole length of the line again. 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TWELFTH NIGHT CONCERT

This year's Twelfth Night Concert will take place on 5th January. The Friends of St Eadburgha's, who are promoting the 12th Night Concert, are working in close support of the Parochial Church Council to raise the funds necessary to complete the outstanding maintenance repair work at St Eadburgha's. Two thirds of the work was undertaken this summer but the remainder can only be completed when the funding is in place. The Friends hope that the Broadway community will rally round to ensure that the village's oldest, and only Grade 1 listed building, does not fall into disrepair.

Once again Peter Medhurst hosts and presents a programme of music which in part one reflects on the story of the Three Kings. The second half of the evening is, by contrast, light and occasional in atmosphere.
