BROADWAY STATION UPDATE

The 'Bridges to Broadway' share offer, which was launched with the aim of raising the £500,000 needed to repair the five bridges between Laverton and Broadway station has now reached almost £300,000. This is sufficient to put the repairs out to tender, and it is hoped that work will start this year. If anyone wants to own a bit of the railway and help move the project forward, now is the time! Shareholders benefit from travel concessions on the railway, and UK taxpayers can reclaim 30% of their donation under the government Enterprise Initiative Scheme. Further details can be found on the GWSR website, or a copy of the offer document can be obtained at the station on a Wednesday or Saturday.

Since the last update in November agreement has been reached with Wychavon Council regarding conditions attached to the planning approval granted for the station buildings. Shortly afterwards, work began on the signal box, which will be sited on the platform on the Evesham side. The walls are slowly rising, and will be partly hidden behind a screen of saplings on the embankment. Meanwhile, construction of the wall of platform 2 continues. A big effort has been made to clear the drainage ditch running along our boundary from Evesham Road to Childswickham Road, and the area is now much tidier.

We have been fortunate that the footbridge from Henley-in-Arden station has been rescued from the scrapheap, and we plan to install it at Broadway. It is almost identical to the original footbridge, and will add authenticity to our restoration.

The 2013 season was very successful one for the railway project, with record numbers of passengers, and successful special events. This year's highlights are the return of 'Wartime in the Cotswolds' at the end of April and the 'Cotswold Festival of Steam' over the late May bank holiday weekend. We also plan to hold another open evening at Broadway Station on Friday 23 May.

Following the appeal for volunteers in the autumn, the railway has enrolled new recruits to its workforce, including some at Broadway. If you are interested in volunteering, or seeing for yourself what we are doing you are very welcome to come to the station on a Wednesday or a Saturday. 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In the last issue of the Newsletter we introduced a new feature by Barbara Baker, the first of a series of interviews with some of Broadway's personalities. For this issue, she went to talk to Roger Bailey.

ROGER BAILEY

Roger Bailey won the 2013 Broadway Community Award. He is Secretary of Broadway Horticultural & Craft Show, responsible for organising this annual event: a quintessential part of village life. I interviewed him to find out more.

"I retired in 1997 and moved from the West Midlands to Broadway: not my first choice, because of the horrendous traffic, but when we came to look round a house in the village, it was quiet. I thought there had been an accident, but the bypass had just opened. That changed the whole perspective of the village - so we bought the house.

I was asked to be Show Secretary in 2003, at the same time as John Keylock, a smashing bloke, became Chairman, and Melvyn Burdett, a fantastic salesman, joined the committee. I hadn't a clue at first, but we three, plus the committee, tried to increase the size of the show and raise money. We improved the marquees; expanded some competitions to classes for anyone in the WR12 postcode; enlarged the photographic competitions and floral art; added wine and eggs; split up different handicrafts; and introduced the 'men only' cake.

There is one fantastic vegetable grower in the village, but if you concentrate on just two things, like, say, potatoes and beetroot, you can beat him. Most of the judges are from the Royal Horticultural Society and some work nationally. People put a lot of effort into submitting: they deserve the best judges I can get.

I knew nothing about horticulture - my wife is the gardener. I am an administrator, though I have entered the show and won two prizes, which was fantastic. I would have won three, but I turned up with six plums, and when I got there, everything else was fives, so I ate one and was then disqualified: plums should have been six - it is so important to read the rules.

If there is a dispute, I have to adjudicate. Sometimes people complain. For instance, they query exactly how the judge measured the vegetables. One year the photographic competition was farmyard animals and the winning image was a sheepdog. I had a lot of complaints, but it depends on your interpretation. Once, an experienced judge ruled out a floral exhibit because it was in a jam jar, so I read the RHS rules and found that a vase can be any vessel that you can put flowers in.

I work hard but have wonderful help. You could never run it without the committee and all the volunteers; and my family all help. We do it to give people pleasure on that one day, and to see the immense joy on people's faces when they have won a prize."

Cllr Barrie Parmenter has several suggestions for continuing the post of full time attendant, including the possibility that someone in the village might like to sponsor the post. Another alternative might be to increase the size of the car park, and hence the revenue, making it possible to pay for our own attendant.

BADSEY BROOK FLOOD ALLEVIATION

Dear Editor,

Our walks around Broadway and its environs take us regularly along the Badsey brook where we have seen the water level rise and fall by about 30cms at the bridge on the Cheltenham Road. The water flows strongly, unimpeded, to the bridge by the Open Door House in Childswickham, and on to the bridge at Murcot. No doubt the clearing of the brook since the 2007 floods has helped the smooth flow of water. Meanwhile, no flooding of properties has been reported by the local media, not even after the higher than normal rainfall in the summer of 2012 ('the highest rainfall since records began' - Environment Agency). No official comparison has yet been drawn between the 2012 rainfall, or even that of 2007, and the recent rainfall which began before Christmas 2013 and lasted until 14 February this year, causing widespread flooding along the Severn, Thames and particularly the Somerset Levels.

However, Broadway is not threatened by rivers; it could be argued, with continuing maintenance of the Broadway and Bunchers brooks, the risk of flooding of the 2007 kind ('once in 100 years' - Environment Agency) has been reduced significantly and, with continued maintenance, is well under control. The proposed construction of a flood storage area for Broadway by the Agency should perhaps be re-examined for two reasons:-

- 1) As illustrated above, the maintenance of the brooks by farmers and landowners through whose land the Broadway and Bunchers brooks flow has resulted in nil flooding of the properties since 2007.
- 2) The cost of the alleviation project is estimated at £3.3million. This could be an underestimate, at a time when the Agency, as reported in the national media, is in danger of funding cuts by the government and a reduction in employees. Certainly, all of the Agency's resources will be targeted on flood defences along the Severn, Thames and the Somerset Levels, and one would expect Broadway to be a low priority for the foreseeable future.

The question therefore is, do we need a flood storage area in Broadway? It would be interesting to hear the views of other residents- especially those who were flooded in the past.

BROADWAY ARTS FESTIVAL - PROGRAMME PREVIEW

Soon the programme for the 3rd Broadway Arts Festival will be out. We are able to bring you an enticing glimpse of what is in store during the first two weeks of June. With the theme 'Changing Times' the Festival will look back 100 years to the era before the Great War - a Golden Age as well as one of social and political upheaval.

The Festival presents a mix of activities suited to all. The opening talk will be given by renowned and acerbic art critic Brian Sewell. There will be a national art competition on the theme of 'Changing Times', with a prize of £1000; a large selection of entries will be hung at Little Buckland Gallery. The new Ashmolean Museum will host a special exhibition of Sargent's work.

A tantalising programme of art will include masterclasses, workshops and demonstrations. Three artists' gardens will be open and there will be talks and tours of two of Broadway's most beautiful and historically important gardens. For music lovers there will be a wonderful variety of instrumentals and voice for every age. Other tempting events feature a school-children's parade, a craft exhibition and Pentecost picnic.

Finally, there will be an amazing line up of speakers. Angela Panrucker will talk on the history of pub signs; Sir Hew Strachan, will talk on the First World War, about which he is a leading authority; Dr Lawrence Goldman, eminent social historian, will talk about the period 1900 -1914; Adrian Barlow, will discuss the response of British writers and artists to the approach and outbreak of the First World War; Colin Harrison, Curator of British Arts at the Ashmolean, Oxford, will spotlight John Singer Sargent; and Dr Muriel Pilkington will talk about the famous Mitford Sisters.

BROADWAY'S 2012 NEW HOMES BONUS GRANT

Every year the government gives the District Council a grant for every home built and occupied in Wychavon. The District Council decided that as each new house puts a strain on local services, amenities and infrastructure, a percentage of this money should be reinvested within the actual area in which the home was built.

The Parish Council understands that Broadway's allocation to date is approximately £68,000.

How to spend the 2012 New Homes Bonus Grant -

The Parish Council voted to allocate this funding towards the Badsey Brook alleviation scheme as part of the local contribution of £312,000 which is required to enable a bid for national funding towards the total cost of the scheme. This decision was based on the following:

- There have been over one hundred and fifty generous donations of £100 in reply to the letter to all residents requesting support, together with other funding raised at various events totalling approximately £30,000.
- Parish Councillors were aware of the misery caused by the 2007 and subsequent floodings - i.e. secondary school-children were unable to get home, hospitals were cut off, etc., and this scheme would reduce the flood risk in Broadway and surrounding areas.
- It was suggested that the funding be raised through the precept, but a referendum would be required with substantial costs involved.
- A large number of flooded properties may face increased insurance premiums, and other parts of the village which did not flood may still face similar increases since they appear on the Environment Agency flood maps.

The Parish Council considered other possible uses of the monies, but the guidelines of the New Homes Bonus scheme state that the proposed project must not have started, cannot be used for running costs or fundraising, and cannot benefit individuals, political or religious activities, or schools.

To enable the grant to be agreed by the District Council, the support of the residents is needed by the Parish Council.
