CELEBRATING FIVE FANTASTIC YEARS !

It is 5 years since the opening of Broadway Village Activity Park and what a roaring success it has been, benefiting the village in many ways: it is an asset to be proud of.

We need to remind ourselves that 8 years ago the village playground in Broadway had just a few pieces of outdated equipment on a 3 acre site owned by the Parish Council.

Despite being the largest village in Worcestershire there was very little to offer our teenagers and the Parish Council felt they were being penalised by not having any outdoor recreation facilities.

This was the motivator in the setting up of a small dedicated and independent Committee who spent 2 years designing, raising funds, purchasing equipment and finally managing the site works for the activity park as we see it today. Over £300k was raised from numerous sources including local donations, every penny of which was spent and accounted for by the Parish Council. We are indebted to Kevin Beasley whose financial background was helpful in the smooth running of the project.

Sadly Gordon Paul, a member of the committee whose accountancy skills were integral to the success of the project, died 3 years ago but his grandchildren visit the Park regularly. and have planted a tree in his memory. The other 2 committee members were Pamela Street whose marketing expertise was invaluable and Connie Wilson who ably represented the Parish Council.

The scheme was such that 4 areas were designated for different age groups and in particular, a Challenge Zone for

teenagers. Even today some of that equipment is still challenging them. The distance between the areas is open grassland and provides safe areas for play without interference from different age groups. All of the equipment was chosen after lengthy consultations with a number of local schools. This trail blazing approach and design has been studied and emulated by many other communities, both regionally and nationally and we are anxious to retain these very qualities to ensure its original integrity and popularity.

The original vision and hope was that the park would deter negative activity and promote positive interactions between parents and children. It really is a beautiful area that the whole community can use and enjoy: parents spend considerable time there with their children and are able to use the equipment as well. On a good weekend over 500 people can be seen using the park and we estimate that over the five years, 150,000 people have benefited from the facility.

Contrary to public opinion at the time, we have experienced very little vandalism. Maintenance, which is very considerable due to the high level of use, is presently part funded by the Parish Council and partly by volunteers. Any voluntary assistance from parents whose children or grandchildren enjoy the park would be very much appreciated: anything from an hour a week to an afternoon a month particularly during the summer school holidays. BROADWAY ARTS FESTIVAL 2014

Broadway was bedecked in joyful bunting for this year's Arts Festival. Musical events kicked off with the enlightening and enjoyable Florentine Arts Ensemble. Other highlights included the charismatic violinist, Michael Bochmann, who, in one concert, wowed with his moving rendition of Vaughan Williams, joyous Bach and virtuoso Paganini.

Marion Mako's garden tours started on a day of torrential rain. Nevertheless, in true British fighting spirit, 44 people turned up, umbrellas in hand, and made the most of two outstanding gardens. Luckily, the weather improved as the festival wore on and sunshine bathed Broadway. The charming artists' gardens benefited from this and proved very popular.

Lectures, too, all went well. For example, Sir Hugh Strachan fascinated a full house, with views that the Great War should be considered in an educational and global context, rather than as a parochial remembrance of the dead. World authority on John Singer Sargeant, Colin Harrison, was both informative and amusing, as was Muriel Pilkington, in her lively lecture on The Mitfords.

The artists' workshops and demonstrations, all in beautiful locations, were inspirational; the musicians' visit to schools was wonderfully received, with all the delighted children singing a rousing song for the performers; and all the exhibitions in the village were very much appreciated.

One of the final events was a festive children's parade down the High Street. Led by a horse-drawn cart and conjurer on stilts, each child proudly carried a lantern they had made. The lanterns were hung on the village green, the children were entertained by the conjurer and sung songs learnt at school, and everyone had fun.

**BROADWAY UNITED CHARITIES with
SIR ARCHIBALD DENNIS FLOWER'S TRUST**

Registered Charity Number 227676

Did you know that the pretty terrace of three cottages just to the right of Broadway Hotel with gardens fronting onto the Green are owned by Broadway United Charities.? This is a registered charity and overseen by a group of trustees drawn from the Parish and the Parish Church, including the vicar of the parish of Broadway as Ex-officio Trustee.

For the historians among you, there were originally ten charities; a number of which were founded in the 1800s, but the earliest going back to 1729 ! The charities listed were Sir Archibald Dennis Flower's Trust, which had purchased the almshouses in 1939, Church House, William Dave's Gift,

John Knowles, Thomas Fewson Eagles, Miss Rebecca Coombe's Gift, Ann Bedford, Thomas William Wilson, Lady Hilda McNeill Memorial Charity and Dr Beadles Bequest. These trusts were generally formed by bequest made by each individual named in their will.

In 1965 the Charity Commissioners approved a scheme to administer all the charities under the title of Broadway United Charities and the funds were to be used for the general benefit of the poor in Broadway, and comprised a long list of benefits, including gifts of coal! To simplify matters a resolution was passed in 1996 that grants of money could be made, or items, services or facilities could be purchased or provided, which it is calculated to reduce the need, hardship or distress of persons resident in the parish of Broadway.

Today the interest from the funds is used to make such payments and although not a large fund, Broadway United Charities are able to assist in a modest way and every request is considered. The cottages are each let to a tenant and although small, they provide a comfortable and convenient dwelling place in the heart of the village.

The trustees would like to draw the attention of residents in Broadway to this charity, so that where there is a need, this can be considered. All requests are treated in a confidential manner. Of course, should you wish to remember Broadway United Charities in your will, then, we will be very pleased to hear from you! Our treasurer is Kevin Beasley, who, as you know, is also the Parish Clerk. JOHN SINGER SARGENT: PORTRAITS AND TRAVELS EXHIBITION

There's still time to catch The Ashmolean Museum Broadway's first exhibition, 'John Singer Sargent: Portraits and Travels' on display until Sunday 27th July. John Singer Sargent (1856-1925) was one of the most cosmopolitan artists of the nineteenth century. The scandal surrounding the exhibition of his Portrait of Mme X in 1884 led him to come to England to seek a more broad-minded public. His celebrated picture, Carnation, Lily, Lily, Rose (Tate) was painted at Broadway, where he spent the autumn months of 1885 and 1886.

This is a small display of rarely exhibited drawings and watercolours belonging to the Ashmolean Museum and to private collections. They range from intimate pencil studies of his family and close friends, luminous watercolours of landscapes in Venice and elsewhere, as well as a remarkable study of Crocodiles.

VIV HALL

Viv Hall is Library Manager at Broadway Public Library. I interviewed her in a small office, amongst books, a desk, plastic crates, cardboard boxes and a sink. It was the only part of the library not to be damaged by the recent arson attacks in the village, and so anything that was to be kept was put in there. However, despite setbacks, the library, like a phoenix, has regenerated, helped by Viv's positive attitude.

"I have worked in Broadway Library for six years; before that I was at Evesham, but this was a step up for me. I enjoy working with books and with the public; I find it very rewarding because you are always helping people - every day is different - whether it is, for instance, finding a train time, or information about a best-selling writer. We used to rely on reference books to get the answers but now it is more often a case of typing a key word into a computer.

We have two first schools that visit quite regularly, and some children do their homework here. We also run a very popular mums and toddlers session, and one to one computer courses. Many of our clients are retired, but we have a middle range as well. We stock a mix of fiction and nonfiction; a regular supply of newly published books, which we shelve facing out, so people can come in and make a quick choice. Sometimes we get very odd things left as bookmarks - from soles of shoes, to shopping lists, to bank statements.

Unfortunately, there were no clues left about the five arson attacks in the village, and nobody knows who was responsible. As well as burning the front door to the library, there was extensive damage inside: the entrance hall carpet, alarm panel, and mechanism for the automatic door, have had to be replaced. Smoke managed to seep over the internal doors and covered the library. Every book and all the shelving had a slight film of soot on it.

These were sent away for cleaning, and during that time, the walls, ceiling and entrance hall were all redecorated.

It was dreadful, and I was very upset, but it enabled us to look at the way the library was set up, and we have changed it. We've made it much more open and flowing; there are no barriers when people come in, and it seems much lighter now.

We are overcoming financial cuts too. Libraries are being remodeled, and in Broadway, there will be a community group raising funds to meet all the costs of running the building. There will still be some library staff, but we will be relying much more on volunteers. We desperately need more - some come regularly, and some just occasionally, but all are appreciated."
