AVERILL CLOSE PLANNING INQUIRY

The Planning Inspector (appointed by Eric Pickles - Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government) has just dismissed the appeal by Redrow Homes against the planning refusal for 70 houses on the land between Averill Close and Springfield Lane.

The Inspector's decision focussed on the key issues which had been headlined by the Broadway Trust in conjunction with Counsel, and which Graham Love addressed to the Inquiry on behalf of the Trust, the Parish Council, the Save Broadway Campaign and the Springfield Lane Association.

These were:

- Whether Wychavon Council could demonstrate a 5 year supply of housing land. He concluded that they could, and therefore the current Wychavon policies constraining the village development boundary should apply.
- That the development was a 'major' development and that there were no exceptional circumstances (which arise from this designation), which might allow the development. When taken with the adverse impacts on the AONB and, to a lesser extent, on the Conservation Area, these considerations did, in Counsel's view, outweigh any advantages from the development.

The Broadway Trust believes that the same key issues apply to the current application for 58 houses along Leamington Rd (Spitfire 2), which is now being considered by Wychavon, so they are now in discussions with Counsel to consider whether any further representations to Wychavon are appropriate. A formal objection

has already been lodged by the Trust on behalf of the village groups and, in conjunction with the Springfield Lane Association, they have subsequently raised further issues relating to surface water drainage.

This does, of course, represent another battle won and the hope is that Broadway can move forward with some cautious optimism if subsequent judgements by Wychavon and the SWDP Inspector now follow the Inspectors decision.

As a result of the village-wide fund raising efforts, the Joint Fundholders Group is in a healthy position to seek Counsel's advice for what currently remains on the horizon.

The Trust committee would again like to thank all our members, the Parish Council, and all the residents of Broadway for their support.

BROADWAY FIRST SCHOOL

This term has been a whirlwind of activity. The whole school has had the theme of world war one, which has been used to support learning across the subjects. The children have been writing plays and poems about the war, making war-time soup in forest school and the parents even got to have a go, helping the children to make poppy pictures in the class 3 and 4 inspire workshops.

We are very pleased to be able to report that our reading programme, accelerated reader, has helped the whole school to improve their reading. The children read books, and then take quizzes, which really motivates them, and helps them practise comprehension. We've also been using a 'Where's Wally' writing theme (part of a national writing competition) to inspire the children's creative writing.

BROADWAY'S GREENS

Did you know that Broadway has a Lord of the Manor? Do you know who it is?

The Lordship of the Manor is held by the Broadway Trust. The title was bought from the estate of Major George Moore of Farnham House who had, in turn, purchased the title from the previous owners. By the time of Major Moore's purchase the only property that came with the title were the "manorial wastes". These are several small pieces of land - the green outside St Eadburgha's Church, the green in front of the cottages next to the Crown and Trumpet, the small green opposite the Swan car park, the car park itself (though that "green" is now surfaced and maintained by the County Council), and several small greens on both sides of the lower High Street. The largest of the manorial wastes is the Village Green. The Trust bought the lordship of the manor, not to gain the title, but to benefit Broadway by preserving the greens, preventing their development, and making them available as a community resource for village events. Of course ownership of the greens brings with it considerable responsibilities, not just routine maintenance of the grass and of the trees that border the greens, but also dealing with the potential liabilities arising from the various uses made of the greens and liaising with the public authorities (the District and County Councils) and those agencies who require access to install services. We share these responsibilities with the Parish Council, whose formal involvement arises from the Open Spaces Act of 1906 and the bye-laws associated with this. The Parish Council acts as the intermediary with the organizations wishing to use the greens, the Parish Clerk being the point of initial contact.

Most use is made of the Village Green, although the smaller greens are used by farmers' markets, food fairs and small scale events. The Village Green is regularly used by local organizations such as churches and schools wishing to raise funds, as a venue for events by other village organizations (e.g. the Horticultural Show, the Arts Festival) and additional use comes via other bodies, including the District Council and the annual Fair. Permission to use the Green is conditional on the users having public liability insurance and a written undertaking that they will abide by the relevant bye-laws. The Trust is presently reviewing the terms and conditions that deal with such use. An important element will be to ensure that users have the appropriate licences from the District and County Councils allowing entertainment and sale of alcohol. In an age of increasing litigation the Trust and the Parish Council have to be aware of the potential liabilities that could arise from misuse, accidents or breaches of the law, and have themselves to be covered by liability insurance. For this reason the Trust, as landowner, has to retain the ultimate right to give or withhold permission to use the Green.

Not only do the greens provide Broadway with a valuable community resource, they help create the very special appearance that earns the village the title of "jewel of the Cotswolds". For that reason alone they need us all to protect and value them, and we are fortunate that that is very largely the case. The Trust will certainly do its best to ensure that they remain a source of pride and pleasure to villagers and visitors alike. Derek Wakelin, Trustee

ASHMOLEAN MUSEUM EXHIBITION

Stitches In Time: Seventeenth-Century Embroideries From The Feller And Ashmolean Collections

The Ashmolean Museum Broadway is to hold an exhibition of eye-catching seventeenth-century embroidery from the Feller and Ashmolean collections in the dedicated exhibition space on the top floor.

Colourful raised and flat work pictorial panels, fine white and polychrome samplers and dress accessories will be included in the exhibition. The embroideries were created through individual use of stitches, colourful silks, metal threads, pearls and semi-precious stones.

The exhibition also includes a remarkable casket that was formerly in the collection of HRH Princess Margaret. It is covered with beautifully worked embroidered panels depicting stories from Ovid's *Metamorphoses*. The embroideries illustrate the themes and concerns which occupied the minds of the young women making them. They often depict biblical stories at a time when religious issues, including the use of images, aroused great controversy.

NEWS FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL

In the last Newsletter we told you who had been nominated for the annual Community Award. The Parish Councillors vote on who receives the award each year, and this year we are very pleased to announce that Graham Love won, for his work in opposing applications for housing developments in several areas of the village. As is tradition, the winner donates the cheque (£100) to a charity, and Graham has decided the Air Ambulance will be his chosen charity.

You will all be aware that Leamington Road is closed due to work by Severn Trent. The work was behind schedule and several promises relating to opening the road for special events (e.g. Christmas late night opening) had been broken. Following a meeting with Severn Trent, the Council has been informed that a new work gang are now in place. The work now appears to be progressing well and we have had assurances that they will make every attempt to ensure that the road is open (one lane using traffic lights) during Cheltenham Festival week.

Some information about the Wychavon Community Grant Scheme. Up to £50,000 is available for voluntary or charitable groups for projects that include all aspects of life (such as community buildings, sports and arts) and for projects that benefit the community (including people from differing backgrounds or differing abilities). If you think you have a project that might fit the bill, please contact the clerk at the Parish Office for more information. The closing date for this year's grants is 27th March 2015.

Every year the Parish Council gives donations to worthy causes. We have received letters of thanks from all the recipients of this year's donations and, along with the letter of thanks from the Evesham Volunteer Centre, we received information about how the residents of Broadway use the Community Car Scheme. This scheme benefits older and disabled people who have no access to public transport. In 2014 seventy four Broadway residents used the Community Car Scheme to make six hundred and twenty one journeys to places such as hospitals, doctors and dentists. The Evesham Volunteer Centre also supports people who are isolated by giving companionship through home visits and the monthly luncheon club. If you feel you would benefit from the services of the Volunteer Centre, or that you might be able to give some of your time to become a volunteer, please contact the Volunteer Centre on 01386 40165 or see Kevin in our Parish Office for more information.

You will be pleased to hear that the Parish Precept, the proportion of your council tax that comes directly to Broadway Parish, has been held for another year. So, even if council tax goes up, you can be sure that the Broadway Parish Council section of the council tax has not increased.

In the last Newsletter we highlighted the issues of people parking all day in residential roads. Although this is not illegal, it can be highly annoying to the residents. We are asking residents who have a persistent problem

to let us know. We will need evidence (times, dates, place) which we can take to the County Council to see if there is anything that can be done to discourage all day parking in these areas.

The General Election in May is not the only one coming up. If you are interested in your village, have a bit of spare time and want to make a difference, why not stand for the Parish Council? Nominations for this election close at 4pm on the 9th April. A NURSE AT THE FRONT

It would be understandable if you were beginning to suffer from 'World War I' fatigue. The subject has filled our screens and newspapers for months. For those who were involved in it, however, there was a long way to go. After the Christmas Truce in December 1914 the fighting resumed, and in April 1915, with the second battle of Ypres, came the inhuman use of chlorine gas as an instrument of war.

Trying to cope with shattered bodies, minds and lungs of the troops was a dedicated band of doctors and nurses. One nurse, Edith Appleton, known as Edie, joined the military nursing services at the outbreak of hostilities and served behind the front lines in France and Belgium until 1919, receiving the OBE and other honours for her efforts. During this time she kept detailed diaries which were rediscovered a few years ago by her great-nephew, Dick Robinson. These poignant and moving diaries present acutely observed accounts mixing sadness and horror with wit and courage, together with an appreciation of the natural beauty around her.

Following their publication excerpts have been read on Radio 4's *Making History* programme and they also provided source material for the television drama *The Crimson Field*.

Dick and his wife Lisa will be talking about the diaries and reading extracts from them on **Saturday 18th April in Broadway United Reformed Church at 3.00 pm.** The talk will be followed by First World War songs and trench cake (as sent to servicemen overseas).
