HMS BROADWAY'S BELL MAKES A HISTORIC JOURNEY

On Saturday 26th September three residents of Broadway made an historic journey to Burnham-on-Sea in Somerset. They were transporting the original ship's bell from the destroyer HMS Broadway, formerly USS Hunt, to the official unveiling ceremony of two plaques on the Esplanade sea wall by Captain Michael Garrick, USN, from the American Embassy in London. This was followed by a civic reception at the Princess Theatre, where the bell was displayed in all its splendour. It was afterwards returned to its permanent home in the village, at the Lygon Arms hotel, where it has been kept ever since Donald Russell offered it safe keeping when he managed the hotel, after the decommissioning of the destroyer.

The ceremony commemorated the transfer of fifty WW1 American destroyers, part of the USA/UK Lend and Lease agreement in 1940 to help our floundering war effort. Known as 'Gift Horses', the role of the destroyers was to protect our convoys crossing the North Atlantic.

HMS Broadway had a distinguished record; probably her greatest achievement was in May 1941 when she took part in the capture of U boat 110 and the seizing of an Enigma machine complete with

codebook - a seminal event for Bletchley Park, though its significance was not realised at the time.

The history of this special naval connection of Broadway with the sea and to the Second World War is commemorated on the north wall of St Michael's church, along with a memorial to other fallen war heroes of the village. A facsimile of the ship's crest donated by the people of Broadway is also displayed there. (But do watch out for the small step if you go to have a look.)

Councillor Neville Jones OBE, of Burnham-on-Sea, the founder and organiser of the project, was aided by the American Embassy and the Prime Minister's Office. Connie Wilson, representing the Parish Council, and Michael and Pat Blanchard, who helped with the research, attended on behalf of the village. They would like to give their grateful thanks to all who contributed valuable information.

As we head towards Christmas we thought it would be good for you to know what your Parish Council has been doing towards the Christmas celebrations in Broadway. At the last meeting, a grant was approved which will pay for proper electrical connections to be made for the lights in the trees, plus three more strings of lights. So many people love the lights, it really makes the village look magical, and we felt this was a really worthwhile cause.

Other projects that the Parish Council have supported include:-

A new sign outside the old Coach and Horses, Doug Eyre did the art work for this and the sign was made by Jeff Humpage.

A grant to the Youth Club to enable them to maintain and enhance their toilet facilities.

A grant to Broadway Bowling Club for replacement guttering on the club house.

Financial support to the Broadway Food Festival, which proved to be a very successful event.

So many people have been enjoying the Activity Park that some of the equipment is suffering from wear and tear and is now in need of replacement. We will be arranging replacement items in the coming months so that our lovely park is kept fully open and enjoyable for all. We really appreciate the support given by John Hankinson and his team in keeping the Activity Park neat, tidy and in working order.

The Parish Council is fully supporting the legal challenge in the High Court regarding the land on Leamington Road. This will be heard on November 10; we will let you know the result in the next newsletter.

Members of the Parish Council have met with officers from the District Council to discuss the Neighbourhood Plan. Further meetings will be arranged, and if anyone feels that they have something to contribute to the production of the plan, please contact the clerk (Kevin Beasley) or Councillor Gordon Franks.

The Council is aware that sometimes there is a proliferation of posters and banners around the village. Please could organisers of events/shows use a minimum of posters, put them up no more than two weeks in advance, and remove them as soon as possible after the event. Your co-operation is very much appreciated and if you have any queries then please speak to our parish clerk.

JIM SCHMITZ

The Barbara Baker interview

I talked with Jim Schmitz to get a perspective on life in Broadway from a relative newcomer, who lives here with his wife and young son, has set up his own business and is passionate about the village and its inhabitants.

"The question a lot of people ask when they first meet me and hear my voice is 'Are you enjoying visiting Broadway?' I am originally from Ohio, in the U.S.

I trained and worked as a journalist, particularly in radio and television. My first big TV job lasted only six months because the news announcer left to star in 'The Jerry Springer Show'! But that got me interested in communications and I went back to college, three years before people knew the term World Wide Web. I did some research work and was picked up by AT&T, the company founded by Alexander Graham Bell, and spent nearly a decade travelling across the Americas in different roles, eventually entertaining corporate dignitaries across the Continent. I met my wife, Micaela, who is a musician, and we married in New York. Soon after we moved to Holland, but after two years I grew tired of lager and buses. A friend, Ian Harper, who created the original Broadway Village Website and helped get the Newsletter off the ground, recommended Broadway. I found an old property on Leamington Road, in need of repair and we have been slowly refurbishing it since 2003.

In 2005 I decided I was spending way too much time on the road so I started a very tiny company, Permutation, which helps small local businesses with their technology needs. If I had to give one piece of advice to an individual or business it would be to back up your computer. Eventually your precious work, pictures, letters, will be corrupted or disappear, whether it be a virus, a glass of water, a fire - just backing up periodically will keep them safe.

I work from home or directly at the customer's business. So, generally, Micaela and I can be happy living anywhere, but then our son, Max, was born and we wanted to provide the best environment we could. We began to consider where and how we lived and that is where Broadway really shines. I grew up on the outskirts of Cincinnati, roughly the same distance, geographically and culturally as Broadway is from Birmingham, so the idea of community and knowing your neighbours was quite familiar to me. I also like that Broadway is a large, working village. People could spend their whole lives only going ten miles away and have all their needs supplied.

We were lucky to get involved in a lot of things early on, like the Broadway Parish Plan, which got us out into the community. So when we began to think about what kind of people we wanted Max to be around on a regular basis, a lot of our friends and neighbours were great candidates. Many people in Broadway have a healthy respect for ongoing education; there is a love of the outdoors and exercise. People here are often much older than they appear, which is always a good sign! Also, many are extraordinarily kind.

When Max was born, Micaela was seriously ill and had a very extensive stay in hospital. When you are trying to run a small business, watch over a newborn and visit your wife in hospital every day it is taxing, but a lot of local

people helped - some were friends and some, at the time, we barely knew. They volunteered to baby-sit, bring food, do my laundry and they made it possible for us to survive the first couple of months. Micaela was actually still in hospital when Max was baptised. The doctors had no idea when, or if, she would be coming out. A friend from Alcester, Father Richard Jones, performed the baptism and other people organised everything else. Friends and neighbours, both Catholic and non-Catholic, attended. The Broadway community is one where we feel not just welcome, but at home.

Max now goes to The Little Friends of St Mary's School twice a week and he has been to lots of the early year activities at the Children's Centre, next to Broadway First School. We also have a top-notch activity centre: Broadway is very child and adult friendly. When I return to the US I miss the ability to wander out of my house to a restaurant or pub and then walk back home. I miss interesting neighbours and friends - people that I hope will inspire Max and make him think, 'That's what I want to be when I grow up.' "
