Broadway Station Update

Work on the station building continues. During installation of the steel canopy supports the sections were bolted together, but these have been replaced with rivets by members of the railway's Steam Locomotive department. Work is now progressing on fitting the timber to which the roofing sheets will be attached and the decorative 'dagger board' cladding on the southern gable end is complete. The concrete bases for the footbridge staircase on Platform 2 have been installed while there was still vehicular access to the trackbed through the gap in the wall of Platform 1. This has now been closed and the wall is being rebuilt.

To the south of our site the railway's Permanent Way department has made swift progress laying track on the extension and the rails are now within sight of the station. At time of writing contractors have almost finished their work on the embankment between the Childswickham and Evesham Road bridges but the area has not yet been released to the railway. Meanwhile, a start has been made on laying track for the sidings north of the platforms up to our boundary fence near the Springfield Lane bridge.

Members of the railway's Signal and Telegraph department have continued work on the signals. With track advancing at both ends and signals in place the site is beginning to look like a railway station!

Our bric-a-brac shed continues to attract visitors. However, all good things come to an end and this autumn the shed will have to be removed so that development of the driveway can be completed. Therefore, please note that we will not be able to accept any more donations of sale items. Thank you to all those who have supported us in the past.

BROADWAY ARTS FESTIVAL Student Arts Grants of £500-£1000

Applications for the annual student arts grants offered by Broadway Arts Festival Trust are now open for 2017, supporting local students seeking careers in the arts.

Each year, arts grants are awarded to local students age 18 or over on September 1st, starting or already in full time education in the arts. These bursaries apply to students studying Fine Art, Applied Arts, Music or the Performing Arts. The grants are given in order to help students with course expenses and travel for their field of study. Priority will be given to applicants who currently reside in the parish of Broadway and WR12 postcode, but applications will also be considered from neighbouring areas.

Last year, six grants were awarded to students on a wide range of courses from the world of opera and musical theatre, to film studies and textile design & manufacture.



Jude Simms-The Barbara Baker Interview



Jude Simms has lived in Broadway for 32 years and for most of that time she has been caring for young children, whom she speaks about with a palpable passion.

"I am Leader Manager of Broadway & Towerview Playschool, which means I run it with my fabulous team. About 25 years ago, my middle daughter was very ill and I needed some money, so I started working at a preschool in Broadway. Then Ofsted started inspecting, and the two fabulous ladies who had set up the preschool, Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Marchant, decided to leave and I took over. I already had an Art Degree, but funded by government grants, I achieved my Level 3 in Childcare, a Degree and Masters Degree, and then Early Years Professional Status.

The youngest children come to Broadway Playschool at the United Reformed Church Hall, and 3-4-year olds go to Towerview Playschool within the Children's Centre next to Broadway First School. We try to keep it very much as Mrs. Mitchell ran it, which is home-from-home: a place where children feel secure, which is extremely important to me. We are non-profit making – it is a community group – I don't own it. Most of our staff are part-time, and almost always have come from our parent base of local people.

I have also recently started a group for parent and toddlers, but it can be any carer, like a grandparent, who wants to come along to the Children's Centre for a couple of hours. Parents have access to books and toys, in a place where they are not judged, and might get some advice, for example on potty-training. We can ask a Health Visitor to come in and can all share our experiences. I have run about sixteen of these groups in the past, where the parents gel and take over themselves. One group still meets up even though their children have grown up and got married!

I feel there are a lot of lonely parents coming into the village. They might be working full-time and stop to have a child, so how do they get to know anybody? If you are used to driving to work in Birmingham, Cheltenham, or Evesham, you don't know the people who live here. Also, from being a career person to staying at home with a baby can be quite a shock. When I moved to the village and had my first child, I went to the toddler group and found it brilliant: it is where I made my closest friends, because everyone was welcomed.

I love working with children. I could spend all day playing – my children think I have stuck at four years old. I will always defend the right of the child to play: they are amazing little people. I also love the way they think and how they see through you. If I'm a bit tired, a child might say: 'You're not very good at this today. I think you should go and have a cup of tea.' When children are secure and happy in the setting, feeling it belongs to them, they want



to learn, have autonomy, and play fairly within the ground rules.

We feed into about six schools. Some parents worry about their children making new friends, but at this age a child might make a friend because they have Disney socks on – it can be quite arbitrary. As Towerview Playschool backs onto Broadway First School, we see pupils through the fence and they come and chat and we sometimes use their hall so that a transition to a large school later is not so daunting. Financially, it is not a brilliant career, but the rewards are immeasurable. I see children now working in Budgens and they recognize me – you can see the continuity.

I think our community is really important and we should value it. This is a lovely village but it could easily get spoilt. I don't mean by development – I think we need more people in the village and we need more of a mix so it is a living village. When I first moved here I found a lovely babysitting circle, which I joined. But I live on the council estate which, at the time, some considered 'the wrong side of the tracks' and so some people wouldn't babysit for me. We need to get rid of those barriers and, whilst protecting some things, ensure that the village doesn't become too insular. There are families who struggle because they don't have transport and there are not enough job opportunities. I don't want to earn more money in a school or university because my heart is with this group. Sometimes just getting people together, like perhaps getting some folk from the retirement home to work with the children, would be nice. Some of our children don't see grandparents; they are lucky if they see both parents.



I was involved in the first Parish Plan and my husband, Andy (a Head Teacher in Bidford-on-Avon) and I were both involved with Swings And Things, the first group to try to get equipment approved for the playing field. I enjoyed the Parish Plan, especially trying to get responses from children about what they wanted, which were things like guinea pig races on the Green and a crocodile pond. Children come up with such interesting ideas."

So when do we sew?

Broadway Embroidery Group



In July members of the Broadway Embroidery Group visited the Broadway Museum to view the Embroidered Bodies Exhibition. We were delighted to see such intricate and beautiful pieces ranging from small Chinese shoes to Indian tunics. We recognised some of the stitches and techniques but most of us can only aspire to such work. If you are at all interested in embroidery or textiles you have time to visit the exhibition which closes on 10th September.

Beckford Silk was our destination in August. We were met by Ann Hopkins who gave us a talk and tour. Her father's love of colour gave birth to the company which started in their home. At 80 he still dyes and finishes many natural silk fabrics imported from China.

Silk scarves are the mainstay of the business. It was an approach from the National Trust, followed by the growth of the heritage retail market, that Beckford Silk has to thank for its success. It is now the UK's premier supplier of high quality silk scarves to museums, art galleries and tourist destinations.

Ann explained the process from receiving the client's brief to the design of the scarf or tie, the type of silk fabric to be used and the exact colours required to achieve the finished product. Production is moving away from traditional screen printing to digital. We were able to see one of their large machines producing the Wheat Field Scarf for the National Gallery. The edges of the scarves are still hand rolled for that luxury finish.

After a wonderfully informative and interesting tour we visited the shop and newly opened gallery. There is also a large showroom of silk fabrics offering 80 colours in 12 different weaves! Our morning finished in the tea rooms where we chatted about all we had seen. Do take a look at Beckford Silk's website for full details of tour days and shop opening times.

News from the Parish Council Meeting held 22nd June 2017



During our regular police report CSO Schoenrock highlighted several incidents involving 'Nottingham Door Knockers' selling items door to door. All such persons should have a pedlar's or hawker's licence which should include a photograph. If someone calls at your house, but does not have a licence, do not deal with them. If they persist contact the police.

The Parish Council had a presentation from Mr. Colin Fewell of GWR (Gloucestershire, Warwickshire Railway) who confirmed that Broadway Station will be open on Good Friday 31st March 2018 followed by a grand opening event in the autumn. Visitors will be encouraged to use the Milestone car park, as there is only a small allocation for disabled drivers at the station. It is hoped that local bus companies will include the station as one of their stops.

From time to time, people donate benches to remember loved ones. It has been agreed that an additional bench will be placed along Station Road, the position still to be decided.

The Parish Council requested a meeting with our MP Nigel Huddelston to discuss our concerns about the closure of Lloyds Bank. The Parish Council, although very disappointed at the closure of the bank, is pleased that there is a proposal to have a mobile bank three times a week.

In order for you to get to know your Parish Councillors, there are now posters in the Parish Office window and on the Parish Council notice board in the High Street showing photographs of the Councillors with a brief profile stating on which committees they serve.

Councillor Franks, Chairman of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group, updated the Council on progress, including the public meeting held in the Lifford Hall recently. The questionnaire has been sent out, the results of which, together with other information, will form the basis of the policies within the plan. The Parish Council would encourage everyone to support the Neighbourhood Plan as this will influence the future of the village.

The Cotswold Explorer

is a documentary website that makes short historical documentaries about the

towns and villages in the Cotswolds, presented by Robin Shuckburgh. It all stems from a show that originally aired on local television, and has since grown into it's own brand. We have made films about the buildings of Bampton, the village used as Downton in Downton Abbey, and these films have kickstarted our audience base both locally and in America.

Broadway is just the second place we have visited to make a documentary. Our film about Burford tested the format, and our Broadway film sees an improvement that we will carry forward to the next town. What is unique about these films is that they are not advertorial in content to promote tourism, but merely to give a brief overview of the history of the town and present some wonderful visuals to show just

how lovely the Cotswolds are. We see promoting the Cotswolds as a by-product of these films.

In this film, Robin explores the High Street, telling the story of the many artists, painters, designers and writers that brought Broadway to life in the early days. We tell the story behind some of the buildings, from Abbott's Grange to the Lygon Arms, not forgetting the famous Broadway Tower, where it is said up to thirteen counties can be seen.
